This SAR report is prepared by Govt. Degree College Sainj, for the session 2023-24. The Self-Assessment Report (SAR) is a pivotal document in the proposed Internal Ranking Process for government degree and Sanskrit colleges in Himachal Pradesh. It serves as a comprehensive record, showcasing an institution's effective documentation of various events, efficient utilization of human and material resources, and preparation for NAAC accreditation. The proposed ranking system categorizes colleges into three tiers. Government Degree College Sainj falls under Tier 3, which includes relatively new institutions offering only one or two academic streams with student enrollment of up to 500.
